Our History

A More than 30-Year Track Record of Illuminating Gender in Policy Debates

IWPR was founded in 1987 out of a need for an organization whose distinct purpose was to develop comprehensive, women-focused, policy-oriented research. By conducting rigorous analyses using federal data, the social scientists at IWPR shook the gendered and racialized assumptions underpinning public debate.

In its founding year, IWPR analyzed the costs to American workers of not having unpaid leave for childbirth, personal health needs, or family caregiving in its inaugural publication, "Unnecessary Losses: Costs to Americans of the Lack of Family and Medical Leave." A quarter-century later, the Family and Medical Leave Act has become a cornerstone of US employment law and human resource policy. Since then, IWPR has produced widely respected research in a variety of areas that speak to women's experiences and challenges and has helped shape policies that have a real-world impact on women's lives.

Named a top think tank in the United States, IWPR has shifted the conversation on issues such as the gender wage gap, employment and job discrimination, Social Security, welfare reform and access to public benefits, educational access, child care, and many others. Our work and experts are cited and appear regularly in more than a thousand news items each year.







Our Impact

IWPR Research in Action 2023



- IWPR presented a congressional briefing on using recent federal
 infrastructure investments to promote gender equity in fields where
 women have been historically underrepresented. Over 90 congressional
 staff in attendance heard from IWPR as well as speakers from the
 White House and partner organizations about the challenges that
 women working in infrastructure-related industries face.
- IWPR held a briefing for the Democratic Women's Caucus on the results of its public opinion polling showing strong support for congressional action on a range of policies, including paid leave and abortion access, and answered staff questions.
- IWPR's research was featured in state legislative battles over pay equity, paid leave, and education in state capitals across the country, including Alaska, California, Connecticut, the District of Columbia, Hawaii, Maine, New York, Oregon, Texas, Vermont, Virginia, and Wisconsin.
- IWPR's research was cited by the US Department of Education and Department of Labor, as well as publicly used by Senators Durbin, Duckworth, Kaine, and Sanders, Representative DeLauro, and others when introducing key legislation to provide paid sick leave.




